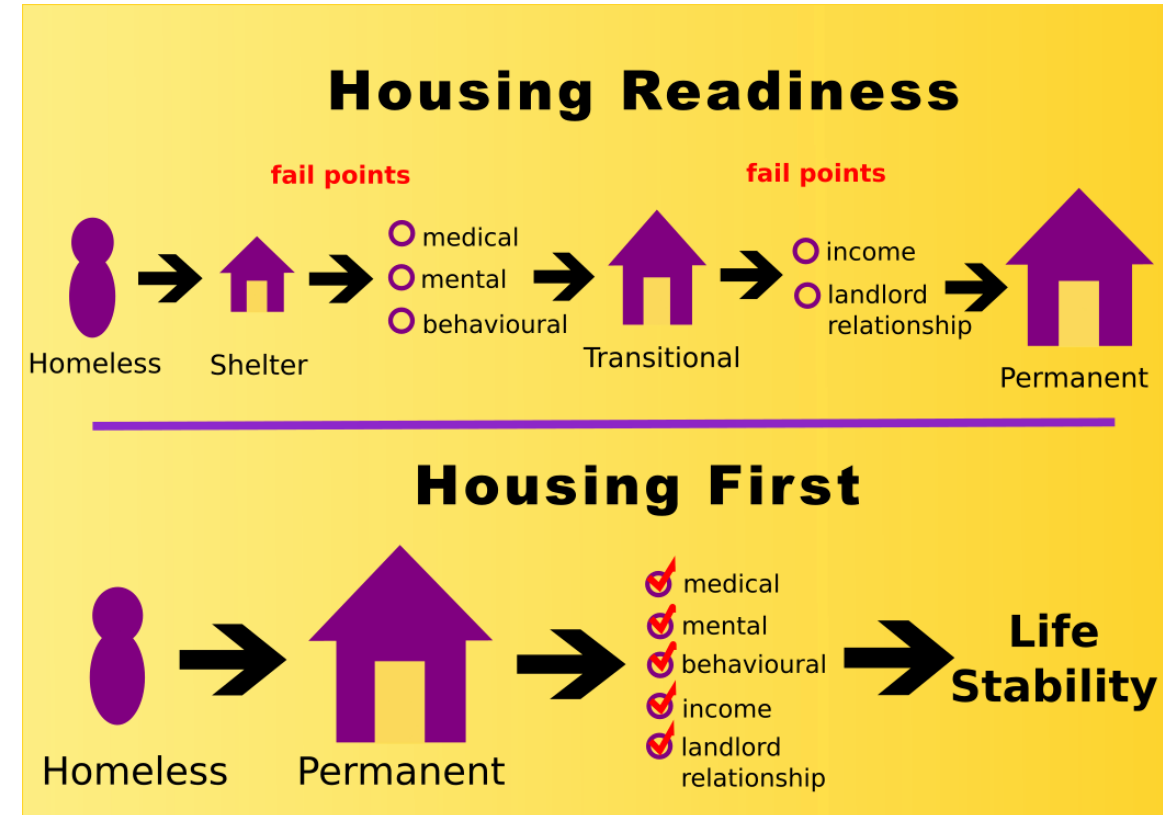

Housing First

- Senate Bill (SB) 1380
- Took effect July 1, 2019
- Everyone is housing ready. Meet clients where they are.
- Prioritizing based on risk and vulnerability, not first-come first serve (Coordinated Entry System)
- Voluntary, quality services are essential.
- Emphasis on permanent housing:
 - Rapid Rehousing (RRH) and Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)





State Coordination with Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council (HCFC)

- **Develop policies, identify resources, benefits, and services to prevent and work toward ending homelessness in California**
 - HEAP and HHAP
 - Housing First (SB 1380)
 - State Interagency Coordination
 - Strategic planning to address homelessness in CA
 - Implement and enforce Housing First law
 - Working groups



HCFC Action Plan to Address Homelessness in California

HCFC Action Plan Approved by the Council March 2021

- 5 Action Areas, 15 Objectives, 101 Specific Activities, 13 state departments
- State departments report twice a year to HCFC with quantitative and qualitative data

Action Area 1. Strengthening Our Systems to Better Prevent and End Homelessness in California



Activities focused on pursuing racial equity in response to homelessness and housing instability; engagement and partnership with people with lived expertise from experiences of homelessness; supporting interjurisdictional and regional planning; partnerships to strengthen outcomes related to education, employment, income, and assets; disaster preparedness and response; and communications and public awareness.

Action Area 2. Equitably Addressing the Health, Safety, and Services Needs of Californians Experiencing Unsheltered Homelessness



Activities focused on addressing health and safety needs and increasing access to State-supported services and programs for people who are experiencing unsheltered homelessness.

Action Area 3. Expanding Communities' Capacity to Provide Safe and Effective Sheltering and Interim Housing



Activities focused on expanding the supply of safe, housing-placement focused sheltering and interim housing models and addressing health and services needs of people staying within such programs.

Action Area 4. Expanding and Ensuring Equitable Access to Permanent Housing in Our Communities



Activities focused on strengthening Housing First approaches and expanding permanent housing opportunities through development strategies, short- and long-term rental assistance, and other rehousing activities.

Action Area 5. Preventing Californians from Experiencing the Crisis of Homelessness



Activities focused on reducing entries into homelessness as people exit and/or receive services through State-funded programs and systems and enhancing communities' capacity to provide targeted homelessness prevention and diversion services and assistance.



New State Laws

AB 1220 (Luz Rivas): California Interagency Council on Homelessness

- Renames HCFC to California Interagency Council on Homelessness
- Adds Secretary of Health and Human Services Agency as co-chair; Adds 5 departments to HCFC membership
- Moves non-state government members to an advisory committee with other stakeholders
- Mandates that state homelessness programs participate in council workgroups and provide the council relevant information regarding their programs
- Removes Housing First exemption for emergency shelters

AB 977 (Gabriel): Homelessness Program Data Reporting: HMIS

- Requires specified homelessness services programs report data into HMIS for state funds (1/1/23)
- New state-funded homelessness programs
- Requires programs report data elements into HMIS that align with HUD federal reporting requirements
- Requires CoCs to continue to share their HMIS data with council staff to ensure accuracy in HDIS
- Requires council staff report out on fiscal data for all state-funded homelessness programs



New State Laws (continued)

AB 27 (Luz Rivas): Homeless Children and Youths and Unaccompanied Youths: Reporting

- CA Department of Education (CDE) to develop best practices and a model housing questionnaire
- Requires Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) to administer questionnaire, report data annually, and post contact information on their website
- CDE will award grant funding for 3 regional TA centers related to homeless youth

AB 362 (Quirk-Silva): Homeless Shelters: Safety Regulations

- Requires city/county enforcement over homeless shelters
- Operators are given 30 days to correct any violations
- Operators that are noncompliant shall be ineligible to receive any one-time state funding, including HHAP
- Each city/ county must report violation information annually to HCD and BCSH

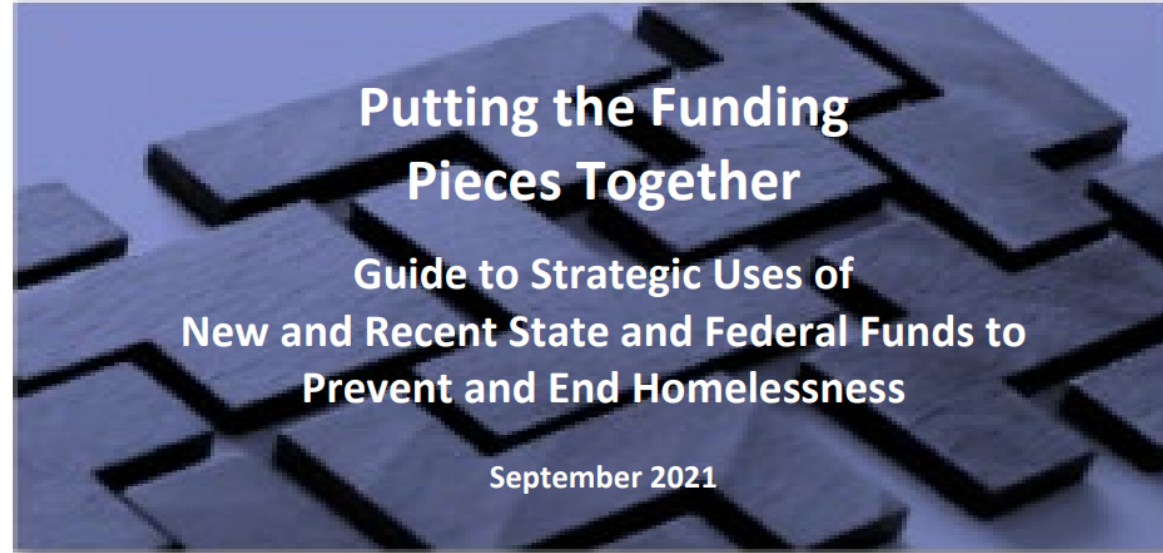

HOMEKEY – via California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD)

Funding Amounts and Time Constraints:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The State budget includes an additional \$2.75 billion in funding for the Homekey program to be administered by HCD over 2 years, using a mix of American Rescue Plan funding (\$2.25 billion) and General Funds (\$500 million) to support the acquisition and conversion of properties into affordable and supportive housing or interim housing. 	HOMEKEY
Eligible Activities:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Awarded funds can be used to provide permanent or interim housing for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or at risk of experiencing homelessness. See https://homekey.hcd.ca.gov/content/eligibility got more information on eligible uses. 	
Status of State Actions to Date:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The State announced the release of \$1.45 billion in Homekey grant funds on September 9, 2021 and the Notice of Funding Availability is at https://homekey.hcd.ca.gov/. Applications will be accepted on a continuous, over-the-counter basis. The application will be available September 30, 2021 and due by Monday, May 2, 2022 at 11:59 p.m. PST, or until the available funds are exhausted, whichever occurs first. All applicants will be required to engage in a Pre-application Consultation prior to applying. Another round of funding for Homekey will be announced in 2022, bringing the total to \$2.75 billion. 	
Strategic Guidance for Local Use of Funds:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Recommended Use: These funds should be used to acquire hotels/motels and other buildings and facilities to be used for permanent housing, for housing that can be used as interim housing with eventual ability to convert to permanent housing, or for interim housing with a focus on supporting people to exit to permanent housing. A priority should be placed on using funding to create permanent supportive housing units, if feasible. 	

AFFORDABLE HOUSING BACKLOG PRODUCTION – via HCD

Funding Amounts and Time Constraints:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The State budget includes \$1.75 billion in one-time American Rescue Plan funding to provide capital funding to shovel-ready affordable and supportive housing development in lieu of tax credit equity in order to enable projects to proceed to development. The budget requires funds to be expended by June 30, 2024 absent an authorized extension. The federal expenditure deadline is December 31, 2024. Other details regarding program and timeframes are still to be determined as of the release of this Guide; check regularly at www.hcd.ca.gov for more information. 	BACKLOG
Eligible Activities:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Funds are to be awarded in the form of a forgivable loan or grant to a qualified rental housing development to replace a federal and state low-income housing credit equity funding source in a previously-approved HCD application. Construction must commence within 180 days of issuance of an award letter, with an extension available up to 90 days for conditions beyond the control of the development sponsor. 	
Status of State Actions to Date:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> HCD announced the availability of funds in August 2021 and is in the process of developing program requirements. The program will incorporate a streamlined and swift approach that enables awardees to commence construction on projects that have been waiting for a final source of financing. Applications will be accepted Fall 2021 on an over-the-counter basis with tiered funding rounds. 	
Strategic Guidance for Local Use of Funds:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Recommended Use: These funds must be used for projects which have successfully acquired HCD funding and are shovel-ready. Priorities will be established since demand is expected to exceed the \$1.75 billion available, including a priority for households experiencing homelessness. Restrictions will include adherence to key requirements that would have applied if the project had received housing tax credits.

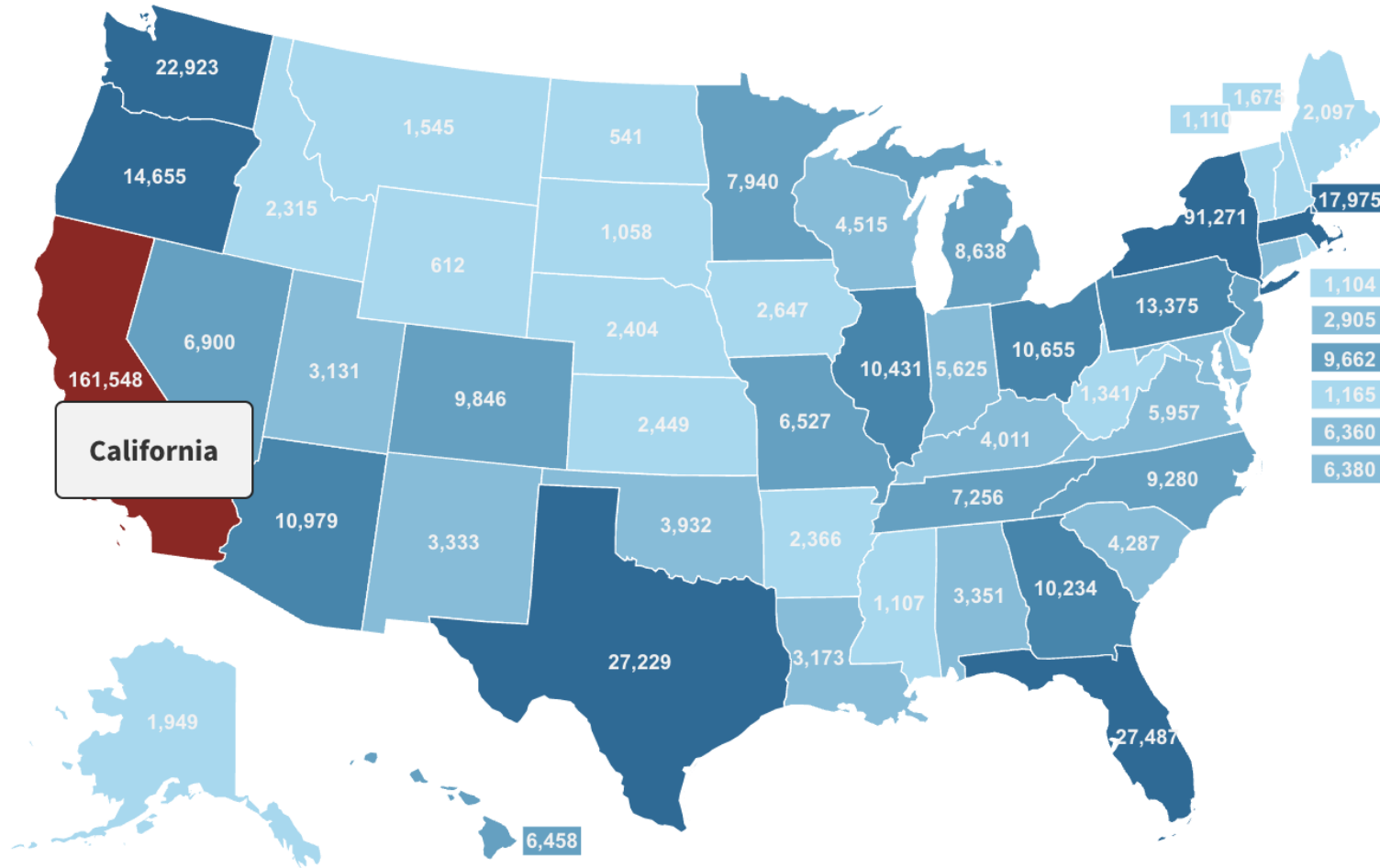

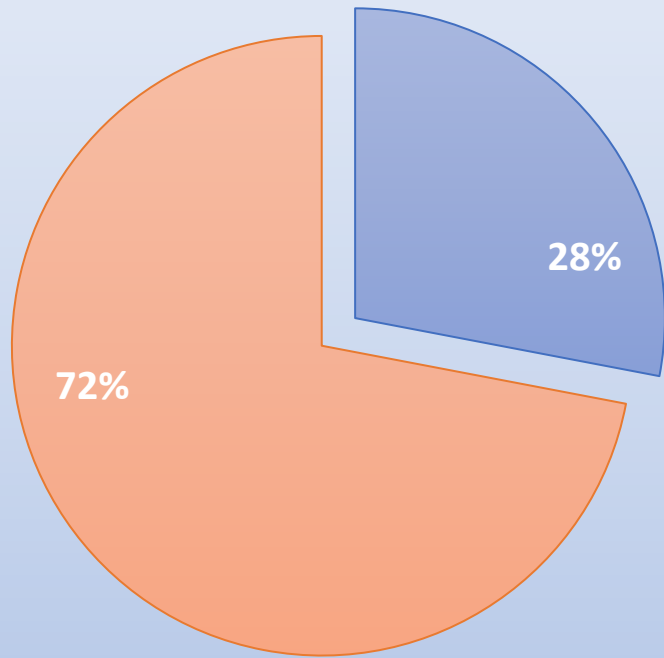

LATEST AND HISTORICAL POINT-IN-TIME COUNT

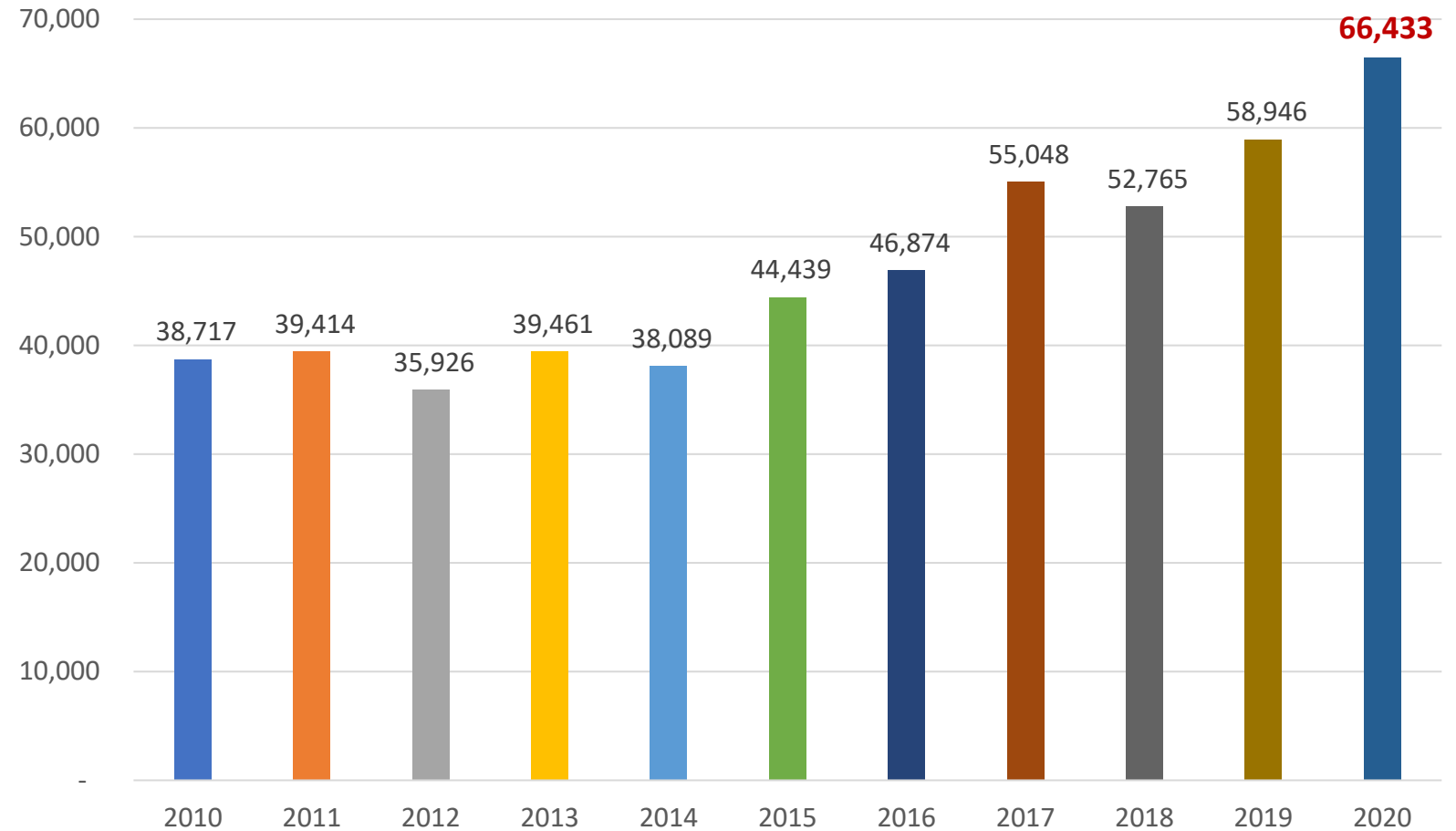

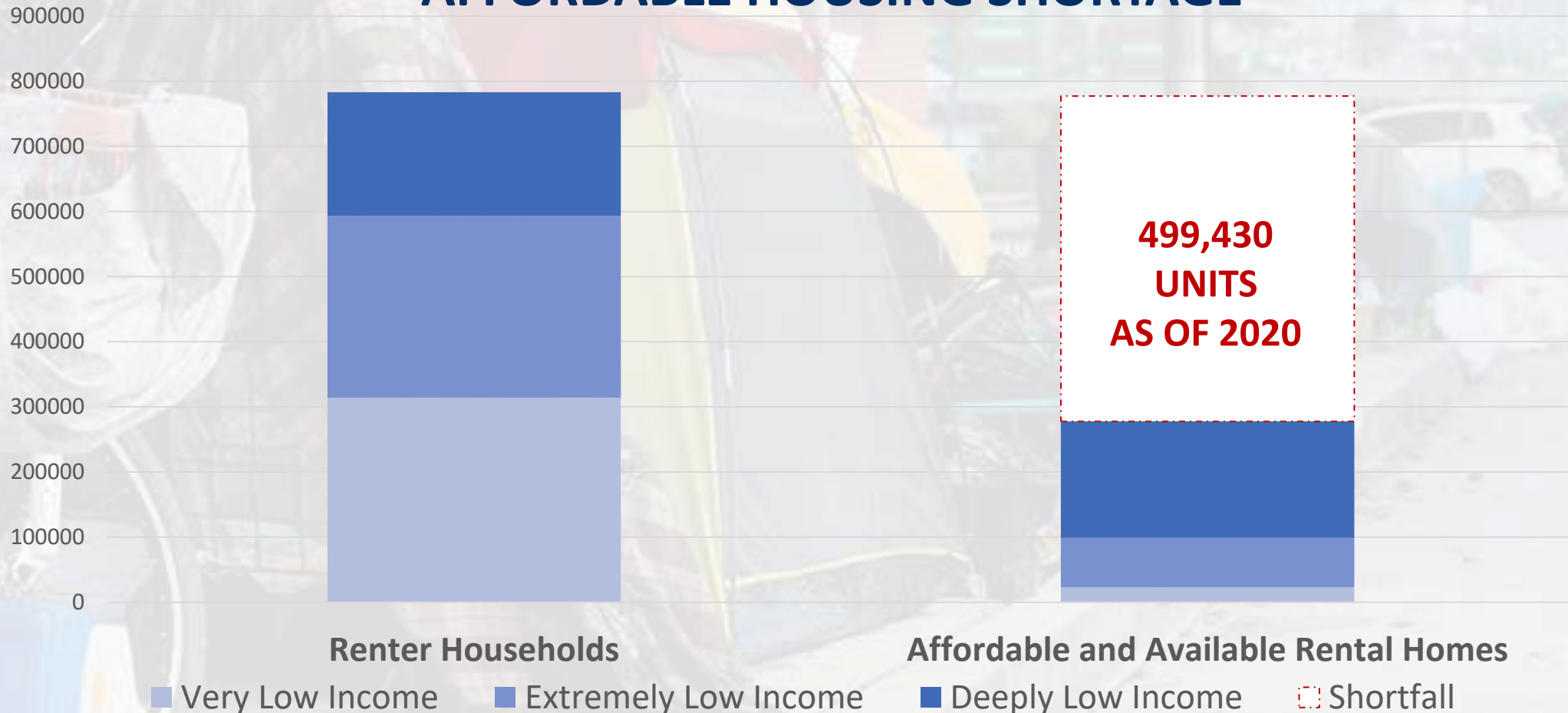

HOMELESSNESS and the AFFORDABLE HOUSING SHORTAGE



Renters in Los Angeles County need to earn \$38.23 per hour – 2.5 times the City of Los Angeles minimum wage – to afford the average monthly asking rent of \$1,988.



Los Angeles County HOMELESS INITIATIVE

The Los Angeles County Homeless Initiative directs, oversees, and evaluates the implementation of strategies approved by the Board of Supervisors to prevent and address homelessness, largely funded through Measure H, including:

- homelessness prevention services
- street-based outreach
- supportive services such as health and mental healthcare, substance use disorder treatment, criminal record clearing, benefits enrollment, job training and employment, etc.
- interim housing
- permanent housing

TIMELINE

2015

- Board of Supervisors creates Homeless Initiative within CEO

2016

- Homeless Initiative Strategies and \$100M startup funding approved
- State of Emergency declared on Homelessness, Measure H placed on ballot

2017

- Voters pass Measure H, first ongoing funding stream to fight homelessness
- Homeless Initiative begins tapping Measure H to fund 21 of its 51 Strategies

2027

- Measure H expires unless renewed by voters



Measure H increased both the types and numbers of interim housing beds and permanent housing units by funding:

INTERIM HOUSING

- Capital Funding (One Time)
- Operating Funding

RAPID REHOUSING

- Housing Navigation
- Rental Subsidies
- Supportive Services

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING (PSH)

- Housing Navigation
- Some Rental Subsidies (emphasis is on Federal Subsidies)
- Supportive Services - LA County is funding Supportive Services for all PSH countywide, whether project-based or scattered site

SUPPORT FOR FEDERAL VOUCHER HOLDERS

- Landlord Incentive Program
